### Day Trips From Paris

The next morning, we had breakfast by Place des Vosges.























# **ICELAND**

Day 1. Airport pick up. See <u>The Bridge Between Continents</u> - a small footbridge over a major fissure which provides clear evidence of the presence of a diverging plate margin. The bridge was built as a symbol for the connection between Eurasian and North America tectonic plates. Take time to explore more of <u>Reykjanes Peninsula</u> before your scheduled stop at the <u>Blue Lagoon</u>. The landscape at the peninsula is rough and a bit alien looking. There isn't all that much grass, instead there are great lava fields covered in moss. There are old craters, fissures and bubbling, geothermal mud pools. By the sea there are many places with amazing rock formations, most of them very dark grey. They are particularly spectacular when the wind is blowing and the sea violently hammers upon the rocks, wave after wave. Dinner in Matwerk Kitchen.









Check in Hotel Alda for 2 nights. This property has one of the best rated locations in Reykjavik. Located on Laugavegur shopping street in central Reykjavik, this hotel offers modern rooms with a flat-screen TV and free WiFi access. The staff are very accommodating and the breakfast served was impeccable - A great value to consider here. The famous golde is a 5min walk away, while the Main City Square takes about 10min.


















Day 2. Early Breakfast at Sandholt Bakery. Golden Circle. The Golden Circle consists of three equally stunning locations in Southwest Iceland: Pingvellir National Park, the Geysir Geothermal Area, and Gullfoss waterfall. These sights are renowned across the world and are all as spectacular as they are unique. From the beautiful and powerful waterfall of Gullfoss, you have the option to go snowmobiling for one hour at the Langjokull Glacier. Price is around 24.000 ISK (about USD200) pp. From there we go back to Reykjavik. Dinner at Sægreifinn Sea Baron. Their lobster soup is a must. Stop by Laundromat Café for some drinks or dessert. If you have space, have a hotdog by Baejarns Bezu Pylsur.

Day 3. South Coast. Pick up at your hotel at 8:30. We drive over the highly geothermal active mountain area of Hellisheiði towards the town of Hveragerði. From there we drive along the South coast where you will find beautiful waterfalls of <a href="Seljalandsfoss">Seljalandsfoss</a> and <a href="Selgalandsfoss">Skogarfoss</a> as well as the <a href="Black beaches of Vik">Black beaches of Vik</a> and Reynisfjara. Option to insert Glacier Walk on <a href="Solheimajokull Glacier">Solheimajokull Glacier</a>. The price is 9,500 ISK (about USD90) pp. Overnight stay at Laxarbakki, a beautiful local country hotel with a perfect location for Northern lights if the weather conditions are right.

Day 4. North Iceland. Pick up at the hotel at 8:00. We drive towards the beautiful capital of North Iceland, Akureyri, and from there you can head on to Husavik, a great place to go whale watching. If you have time, you can check out the Myvatn area, North Iceland's more intimate solution to the Blue Lagoon as well as enjoy the eerie volcanic rock formations. Another option is a shorter drive from Akureyri to Godafoss known as "The Waterfall of the Gods". Drive Southwest to Hvammstangi where you will spend a night in Mork Superior Cottages, a quaint country place by the Midfjordur Fjord where seals and killer whales can be often seen during the summer. Excellent dinner in Sjavarborg.










Day 5. West Iceland. Drive through a beautiful area of glaciers and great mountains as we descend to the little town of <a href="Borgarnes">Borgarnes</a> for brunch at Geirabakari Kaffihus. Enjoy the rural sceneries in Hvalfaroarsveit, stop to take a closer look at Icelandic Horses and Sheep grazing happily. Take in the views before we head back to Reykjavik. We pass through The Hvalfjörður Tunnel, a road tunnel under the Hvalfjörður fjord in Iceland and a part of Route 1. From the time it was built in July 1998, it has shortened travel time from Reykjavík to the western and northern parts of the island by 45 kilometers (28 mi). Passing the fjord now takes 7 minutes instead of about an hour. Check in Hotel Alda and explore the city at leisure. Try the Tasting Menu in Fish Market. Option to book a Northern Lights Tour <a href="www.re.is/day-tours/northern-lights-tour/">www.re.is/day-tours/northern-lights-tour/</a> on your last evening. Price is 5,900 ISK (about USD60) pp.

Located in the South of France just 30 kilometers (19 miles) north of Marseille, Aix En Provence was an excellent base for our day trips around Provence. Our drives were not more than two hours from point to point then we would still have time to explore the rest of the city at leisure.

It is one France's most beautiful cities known for its gorgeous architecture as well as its vibrant culture. The bustling historic city center can be easily explored on foot. You'll find many cafes, shops and boutiques all around the historic center. If you want to get some shopping done this is a good place to start! Every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday morning the city center hosts Le Grand Marché, which is a great farmers market where you can pick up all sorts of fresh produce.

Cours Mirabeau, the city's main avenue and cultural hotspot, is lined with beautiful plane trees, and houses. The characteristic Roman architecture of the buildings along the avenue is absolutely stunning. The Cours Mirabeau also boasts many beloved cafes and restaurants. Have Dinner in Les Deux Garcons, which is popular with locals and tourists alike.

Also known as the home of Cézanne - father of Post Impressionist Art. Route Cezanne takes you along a journey of inspirations that translated to the maestro's famous paintings e.g. Mont Sainte-Victoire. Some of his paintings can be admired at the Musee Granet. Beside his works, this excellent museum houses art by Granet, Rembrandt, Van Gogh, Monet and more.















We simply followed itineraries to organize our days but didn't follow it to detail. Since we were disembarking in Marseille this December, we decided to hold off Avignon and replaced it with a visit to Arles instead. But what a beauty it was to see Chateauneuf du Pape, illuminated in the evening, on our way back.













Arles is noteworthy for its beautifully preserved Roman monuments. Besides the city's Roman heritage, Arles is also known for its strong sense of cultural identity. Once the home of Vincent van Gogh, the city is home to striking architecture that attracts art and architecture lovers from around the world, and you'll see several of its finest examples as you walk through. One can imagine Van Gogh's life in the city through several places that inspired the artist's works, like the imaginatively named Café Van Gogh in Forum Square. The distinctive yellow-fronted café is said to be the building in Van Gogh's acclaimed The Café Terrace painting. We marveled at the ruins of Arles Amphitheatre where some 12,000 people could once be seated, and then explored the city's intriguing ancient theater. Only two of its original Corinthian columns are still standing, but the ruins certainly hint at its former glory. Walked past St-Trophime church, admiring its carved 12th-century doorway, as we proceeded to our next destination.



A stop at the UNESCO-listed Pont du Gard, a remarkably preserved Roman aqueduct dating back to the 1st century AD.

Our first visit was the lovely French town of Moustiers-Sainte-Marie, set amidst rocky mountains. Spent some good time exploring its medieval streets known for its ceramics and pottery shops.

The Notre-Dame de Beauvoir chapel, sitting high in the notch above the village, dates back to the time of Charlemagne in 8th century, and was restored in the 12th and 16th centuries. The chapel is actually built on the site of an even older one from the 5th century. The steep walk up to the chapel follows a wide paved path, passing through defensive doorways. The path, lined with 12 stations of the cross, has been used for pilgrimages to the chapel since the year 470.

Lunch of regional Provençal specialities at a terrace cafe before making the most of the views over the Maire Valley.




















Admiring views over craggy peaks and the Verdon River. Sublime panoramic view over the landscape.







The 'Grand Canyon of Europe' slices a 25km swath through Haute-Provence's limestone plateau all the way to the foothills of the Alps. Etched out over millions of years by the Verdon River, the gorges have formed the centrepiece of the Parc Naturel Régional du Verdon since 1997. With their sheer, plunging cliffs – in some places 700m high, twice the height of the Eiffel Tower – the gorges are a haven for birds, including a colony of reintroduced griffon vultures.

The less glamorous but equally beautiful little sister to nearby St Tropez, those leaving Provence for the sundazzled shores of the French Riviera will find everything they're looking for in Cassis. This is the South of France at its most postcard-worthy - vast sandy beaches flanking a pretty harbor of painted fishing boats and magnificent yachts, and traditional cafés lining the stone-paved streets.

The ancient fishing port of Cassis is now a popular seaside resort, marrying its historic architecture with a flush of modern restaurants and boutique hotels, but the town's most unique selling point is its location. Set beneath the towering white limestone cliffs of the Cap Canaille – France's highest cliff – and surrounded by 'calanques', a series of sheltered inlets, home to the region's renowned white Cassis stone quarries.

It's Cassis' laid back small-town vibe, along with its selection of pristine beaches and the dramatic Castle of Cassis, that makes it a magnet for tourists during the summer months, but the town also draws a steady stream of wine lovers to its surrounding vineyards, celebrated for their historic Cassis wines.

Haut Koenigsbourg Castle. Built in 12th century, the Castle occupied a strategic position controlling the wine and wheat routes to the North and the salt route that came from the










